
The Boy Who Cried Bigfoot! by Scott Magoon


Where She Went by Gayle Forman


That Night by Chevy Stevens

Chevy Stevens is a Canadian author who has written 4 gripping thrillers so far.


Hotel on the Corner of Bitter and Sweet

Ghost Boy by Martin Pistorius




They all thought he was gone. But he was alive and trapped inside his own body for ten years.
